What is an 'unpaid carer'?

An unpaid carer is a person, of any age, who is providing support to someone who would struggle without that help.

Support provided can take many forms but may include things like:

- Helping with shopping, personal care or medication
- Providing emotional support or companionship
- Organising daily tasks and routines, or helping someone remember things

You don't need to live with the person you support, or even be related to them, to be recognised as their carer.

Using the term 'carer' to describe your relationship may feel strange, but, identifying as a carer can open the door to further support to help you in your role.



What support is available for unpaid carers?

Unpaid Carers Rights:

As a carer, you have the right to support, including a Carers' Assessment to look at your own needs. Hospitals should also involve carers in discharge planning. Letting staff know you are a carer helps ensure you are included and supported.

Carer Support:

Alongside your legal rights to access support, many unpaid carers charities exist to give carers a space to think about their own needs and wellbeing. Smaller carers charities usually support a particular local area, so support offered will differ between organisations, but often includes things like:

- Practical advice and information to help you in your role
- A chance to talk about how you're feeling
- Opportunities to meet with others in similar situations

Usually unpaid carer charities welcome anyone in a caring role, with no minimum requirement for the type or amount of caring responsibilities.

Local Support:

Here in Sussex, three local charities are dedicated to supporting unpaid carers. Each of us covers a particular geographical area.

- Carers Support West Sussex
- The Carers Centre for Brighton & Hove (Part of the Brighton & Hove Carers Hub)
- Care for the Carers East Sussex

For projects that span the whole of Sussex, our three organisations work together as the 'Sussex Carers Partnership'.
